Garney and Gail grew up in Seattle and, although they didn't know it at the time, they only lived about a block away from each other. A few years later after Garney finished a tour of duty in the US Army they were married. That was two kids, two grandchildren and 44 years ago.

In 1965 Garney joined the Bellevue Police Department as a patrol officer while Gail's career was a stay at home Mom. After their daughters, Terri and Toni were grown Gail re joined the work force. Employment included McDonalds, the Redmond School District and finally the engineering firm CH2MHill.

# **Rider Education**

Watch out for us!

While thinking about something for the rider education article, I came upon the following short clip from England from the GWRRA national website. Every driver education class should show this (<a href="http://ruiner.pwp.blueyonder.co.uk/howclose.mpg">http://ruiner.pwp.blueyonder.co.uk/howclose.mpg</a>) to its students and if you have the capability you should view it as well. It is 30 seconds well spent. It shows how much we miss by looking but not seeing. If you do not have the capability to view this short movie clip, it shows a driver looking right, then left then pulling out from a stop into traffic. He does not see the motorcycle coming from his right which unfortunately slams into his door. If you did watch this clip, did you see the motorcycle coming from the right? It was there, but not very big so it was not "seen".


The eyes and brain work together to "see" things, but sometimes those things that are seen are not truly perceived. We as riders of motorcycles need to be especially aware that drivers of cars and trucks may not see us. We can be right there in front of them; even something as big as Gold Wing but they do not "see" us which in some cases leads to an accident. Unfortunately we as motorcyclists usually lose in these situations.

What can we do? To start with we can drive more defensively. We cannot count on the other driver so we have to do double duty and drive our vehicle more carefully. We have to be constantly on the lookout for an alternate path if the need arises to make a split decision. We also must "gear up" to protect our fragile bodies with appropriate riding clothing and a good helmet. We can wear brighter clothes; make use of our lights and reflectors and if possible add more lights and reflective devices to increase visibility.

As the tag line on the clip says, "Take longer to look for bikes. Think!"

- One full zipper-back touring cover by Dowco their Guardian EZ model. Used only 3 or 4 times. Will fit all Goldwings
- 2 standard fork tubes and springs
- original triple clamp (trike conversion installed a 4 1/2 degree rake triple clamp and longer fork tubes)

#### **Sweet Irish Soda Bread**

This recipe is slightly sweet variation on the traditional soda bread, complete with raisins and a touch of molasses. Soda bread is beast eaten warm with butter and preserves.

Preparation Time: 15 minutes Cooking Time: 1 hour Serves: 8

### Ingredients

2 cups all purpose flour

1 cup whole wheat flour

2 tsps. baking soda

1 tsp. salt (necessary)

1/4 cup unsalted butter, softened

1/2 cup light molasses or sorghum

1/2 tsp. vanilla extract

1 cup raisins

2 tsps. caraway seeds

1-1/2 cups buttermilk

#### Instructions

Preheat oven to temperature 350 °F. Butter an 8 inch round baking dish and set aside. Sift first 4 ingredients together in a food processor or bowl. Add butter and process until mixture resembles coarse meal. Add molasses and vanilla and mix thoroughly. Add raisins, caraway and buttermilk and process until mixture is evenly moist. Do not overwork. Transfer dough to a floured work surface. Knead one minute, adding extra flour to keep dough from sticking. Shape into a ball and transfer to buttered baking dish. Cut an X in the top with a sharp knife. Brush top of bread with milk. Bake 1 hour. Transfer to a wire rack to cool completely before slicing.
