











[Post script: Nobody died]

TURNS

"Ride Your Own Ride", "Pick Your Own Line", don't just follow the bikes in front like a row of ducks. "Look Through the Turn". What is the best line to use in a turn? Some teachings say "Outside, Inside, Outside", others "Slow, Look, Lean, and Roll" or "Stay Outside Until You See the Exit". There are all sorts of catchy words to describe the process of taking corners out on the highway. I am not talking about freeway curves; I am referring to good old fashion two lane twisties. When you are in the twisties, particularly on roads you are not familiar with, there is no substitute for entering a curve conservatively.

You always need to see hazards, be seen by other motorists, maintain good traction, and have the time and skills to deal with whatever the highway has to offer. So the following are some of our observations from our years in the saddle as well as numerous riding safety courses in which we have participated. If you cannot see through the turn you need to slow to a speed that will allow you to react to hazards in time to avoid them. The best time to do this is before you begin to lean the bike. Braking while in a turn destabilizes the bike and reduces available traction. You should enter every curve at a speed that will allow **you to react to hazards and be slightly on the throttle. Being "slightly on the throttle" in a** curve stabilizes the suspension which allows for more precise control.

Look through the turn. The bike is going to go where you are looking. You always need to scan the road far enough ahead so that you can establish a game plan to avoid hazards as they present themselves. So now that you are in the curve, what is the best line to follow? Knowing that you need to see and be seen as far out as possible, you should enter each corner as far to the outside as safe. This allows you to see farther around the corner and you will be seen more easily by oncoming motorists.

In general you will want to move to the inside of the curve beyond the apex of the curve (delayed apex) then move again to the outside of the curve as you are exiting the curve. When you chose to be at the inside of a curve beyond the apex you gain a couple things. You have remained further out for a longer time (see and be seen), you are straightening out the curve thereby reserving traction in case you need to make an evasive maneuver later in the turn, and you are in a better situation should the turn continue longer or tighter than you had expected.

So what do you do if you are still going too fast or the turn is tighter than you expected? Keep looking where you want the bike to go and lean farther. Most of us do not use all the available lean angle of the bike. The bike will scrape pegs long before hard parts scrape.

If you absolutely need to apply the brakes while in a turn, it is necessary to stand the bike upright first. If you brake hard while leaned over, you will likely loose traction and the results will not be favorable.

The Chapter E 2012 Postal Route **Mileage Contest**

Rather than collecting safe miles in 2012 we will be collecting safe points. The objective is to visit as many Post Offices in the state of Washington as possible. There are 608 in our great State. You must take a photo of your motorcycle in front of the sign that clearly identifies the Post Office as proof of your visit. The sign and bike must be clearly identifiable in the photo for any points to be collected. If it can't be done safely than no points are awarded. Here are the rules:

- 1) Everyone who enters gets a chance to win BIG CASH AWARDS!!! Entrants will be put into three groups, each consisting of about one third of all participants. The top third of point gatherers will be entered in for a drawing of \$100The middle third of point gatherers will be entered in for a drawing of \$75The bottom third of point gatherers will be entered in for a drawing of \$50
- 2) Postal Route Mileage Contest is open to Chapter E members only
- 3) Pictures of your motorcycle in front of the Post Office sign must be clearly identifiable
- 4) Each Post Office visit is worth 1 point and each Post Office can count only once for your individual point total.
- 5) 25 Bonus points for the Post Offices visited in the 4-corners of Washington c. Anatone Post Office
 - a. Ilwaco Post Office
 - b. Neah Bay Post Office
- 6) 15 bonus points for Chapter E overnight ride destinations (may or may not be done on chapter rides)
 - a. Ocean Shores b. Forks

c. Grand Coulee

d. Metaline Post Office

- d. Grandview
- 7) Chapter is dedicated to the GWRRA motto of, "Friends, for Fun, Safety and Knowledge".
- 8) The contest begins today (2/18/2012). Postal Route Mileage contest pictures must be turned in by the October 20th Chapter Meeting. No emails will be accepted. Pictures must be bundled together with your name, no limit of the number of pictures per page however the bike and Post Office name must be clearly visible in the picture. Judging of the mileage contest submissions will be done by Chapter E directors or designee. All decisions are final.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL ID CARD - DO YOU CARRY ONE?

It's a smart idea to carry an emergency medical ID card with you when riding especially if you have any medical conditions that ambulance or emergency room medical staff might especially need to know - particularly if you are allergic to any drugs, are diabetic, have an implant (pacemaker, etc.) or have any unusual medical conditions. Information such as blood type, medications, and wearers of contact lenses is important...and of course emergency contact info is essential as well. Keep your card next to your driver's license in your wallet. If you wear a medical ID bracelet, have it noted to say: "See Wallet Card". You can create your own free emergency medical ID wallet card by filling out the information at this website: http://medids.com/free-id.php and then printing the output to your local printer. JOHN K. LEHMAN - R.I.P.

John K. Lehman, considered by many to be the father of the modern trike, passed away on January 5th at the age of 60 in Arizona. The suspected cause of death was a heart failure brought on by an embolism. John was the founder of Lehman Trikes of Spearfish, SD. He developed his first trike in 1984 using a 1981 Honda CB900 in Alberta; Canada so that his wife could have her child ride with her. His second trike was a conversion of a 1984 Honda Goldwing 1200. Word spread about his motorcycle conversions and soon a company was created in Westlock, AB to commercially produce trike conversions. The company was later moved in 2003 to South Dakota where its 50,000 sq. ft. facility is today headquartered not far from Sturgis.

John first displayed his Goldwing 1200 trike conversion at the 1990 Sturgis Black Hills Classic bike show where his trike won first place. The following year, John produced his first Harley conversion. Since then, Lehman has produced trike conversions for the Suzuki, Kawasaki, and Victory bikes as well as the Goldwing and Harley. For a period of time, Lehman Trikes also manufactured trike Tri-Glide conversion kits for the Harley-Davidson company until Harley decided to take this in-house at their own factory in York, PA in 2011. Today, Lehman Trikes has a large number of dealers in seven countries that are factory trained to perform trike conversions. Lehman Trikes, Inc. had recently announced a Letter of Intent from an investment group relating to the sale of Lehman Trikes USA, Inc.

John Lehman developed the Lehman Pride Ride in 2000 which covered 10,000 miles in 45 days that year. Pride Rides since then have had Lehman owners enjoying group rides of approximately five days with the most recent being a ride to Yellowstone National Park from Sturgis. John was inducted into the Sturgis Motorcycle Museum Hall of Fame in 2009 in admiration for his contribution to the industry. He developed the "Good Turn Trike" program in 1998 which begin donating trikes to deserving individuals who loved to ride but who were physically challenged, including military veterans. John's big heart helped raise money for terminally ill children, "Make A Wish Foundation", "Kids n' Chrome", and many other worthwhile charities. John made a huge contribution to the motorcycle industry and he will be greatly missed.

The Flying Heritage Collection Chapter Visit

Chapter E enjoyed an after-meeting group trip to the Museum of the Flying Heritage Collection located at Paine airfield in Everett, WA. The museum was established by Paul Allen (co-founder of Microsoft) and contains a fascinating collection of flyable WWII aircraft kept in pristine condition.



A German Messerschmitt BF-109 first produced in 1935. It was the fastest **airplane of it's time (290** MPH) with about 35,000 planes being manufactured. This particular plane was recovered from a beach near Calais, France in 1988 and **rebuilt. It's narrow landing** gear makes it more difficult to handle on the ground.





British Hawker Hurricane Mark XIIA manufactured in Canada during the war for the RAF. The Hurricane played an important role in the Battle of Britain accounting for 60% of the German planes that were shot down in that conflict. Designed in 1935, it was one of the first planes to succeed older bi-plane fighters. One of its uses was as a night fighter and shot down many German bombers operating under the cover of darkness. The engine is a 1300 HP Packard Merlin. The British Spitfire played a major role in the European theater. It used the design features of racing seaplanes. А agile fighter which could verv outmaneuver the FW190 (below). It first utilized machine guns but later versions had cannons. This was the most massproduced fighter of the allies during WWII. Engines in later models were 2,000 Merlins which provided for very high speeds. Spitfires were used as interceptor fighters and some were also used as fighter-bombers.





The German Focke Wulf FW190 A5 fighter uses a radial engine. First introduced in 1941, the plane had multiple roles as a fighter-interceptor, fighter bomber, ground attack, and night fighter. **It's wider landing gear made for better ground** handling than the FW109. This plane served as the backbone of the German Luftwaffe able to carry heavy loads including bombs. This particular plane was recovered from wetlands in Russia where it had crashed in 1943.

The P47D Thunderbolt fighter, a real beast with a 2500 HP radial engine. This was the heaviest and largest propeller fighter ever built weighing nearly 8 tons. Originally designed to support bombers at high altitudes, it could fly as high as 43,000 ft. Later in the war, it was successfully used as **a ground attack aircraft with it's eight** machine guns. The P47 was so tough that it could absorb considerable battle damage and **still be able to return it's pilot back to home** base.

Replica of SpaceShipOne which was the first privately funded vehicle to fly in space. Funded by Paul Allen for \$20 million, the aircraft reached 62 miles into space in 2003 and won The \$10 million X Prize for being the first private vehicle to enter space. The original aircraft is in the Smithsonian Museum in Washington, DC. Soon, subsequent versions of this aircraft will be used to provide space tourist flights for \$200,000 a ticket. The commercial space flight operation is called Virgin Galactic Airlines (an off-shoot of Richard Branson's Virgin Airlines) and you can make your flight reservation at www.virgingalactic.com - but you have 450 people ahead of you !

P-51 Mustang—one of the most advanced US fighters of the war. It has turbochargers which allow it to climb to high altitudes and with drop tanks, it had the additional range needed to escort our bombers deep into Germany. This was one of the fastest propeller driven fighter ever **produced; a "Corvette" of fighter planes.** Lt. Harrison B."Bud" Tordoff who flew this plane out of a British airbase during WWII, was reunited with his plane at this museum in 2003





The Russian PO-2 has a fascinating story to go with it. The PO-2 became famous as the aircraft flown by female Soviet pilots (known as **the "Night Witches") in their daring nighttime** raids against German forces. The female pilots' tactics involved flying into position close to the ground, cutting off their engines and then gliding through a bombing run. They inflicted little damage, but demoralized the Germans by keeping them awake night after night, and by the fact that they were women. We now want to read the book about these brave women.

MOTORCYCLE CLEANING & DRYING

The start of the riding season is just around the corner and probably you will soon be washing your bike on a frequent basis. Many riders prefer to air dry their bike in order to ensure that water trapped in nooks and crannies is fully removed. While the cheapest way to air dry a bike is to use a leaf blower, this has some downside since the air can potentially contain particles remaining inside the blower from normal vacuuming of leaves, dirt, etc. which can damage your bike's paint and chrome. The better solution is to use a dedicated air blower made especially for drying motorcycles which incorporates air filters and that provides heated air. These dedicated units can completely dry a bike in about 5 to 7 minutes. One brand

of motorcycle air blowers that we recently learned about (thanks to Terry Schock) are the Blaster® models manufactured by Metro Vacuum.

The smallest unit is the Blaster® Sidekick[™] which is a compact 3 lb. portable unit using a 1.3 HP motor that can be found on Amazon and elsewhere for approximately \$70. It heats the air about 25-30 degrees above ambient with a force of 18,000 feet-per-minute.

A mid-size unit is the Air Force® Blaster weighing 8 lbs. using a 4.0 HP motor drawing 9.5 amps driving a two-stage fan to deliver 29,250 ft/min of heated air through a ten-foot hose. Prices seem to run around \$150 for this unit.

The largest unit is the 16 lb. Air Force Master Blaster which uses two motors to push out 58,500 feet-per-minute of clean, dry, warm, filtered air. This unit comes with five attachments and prices are about \$325.

- 2 1/2 cups heavy cream

1/4 tsp instant coffee granules

Pour a small amount of whiskey into a large bowl. In the top of a double boiler, melt the chocolate, stirring constantly until smooth. Mix the melted chocolate with the whiskey in the bowl. Gradually stir in the sweetened condensed milk and the evaporated milk. Stir in the cream, instant coffee granules and the remaining whiskey.

Pour mixture into 3 (750ml) bottles, seal and store in refrigerator. Keep at least 1 month before using. To serve: shake bottle well and serve in small glasses over crushed ice.

DO YOU CARRY A TIRE KIT ON YOUR BIKE? By: Terry Schock

I use a Cycle Pump air gauge and a Cycle Pump air compressor along with a plug kit for flats on the road. The air compressor hooks to the air gauge which hooks to the valve stem on the tire. This way you can monitor how much air pressure you have in the tire while it is pumping and turn it off when you reach the desired pressure. It works great. It will pump up the rear tires on the trike in a couple of minutes. I use it on the road to keep my tires inflated correctly.
